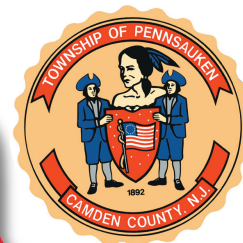

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Pennsauken Goes Greener with Solar Panels to help Drive Down Energy Costs

Pennsauken Township has gone solar, courtesy of a federal government stimulus grant.

Last month, 28 solar panel modules were installed on the Municipal Building roof to help cut energy costs by using the sun's rays to produce electricity.

The green energy project also included installing a new roof with 12 inches of insulation on the circa 1950s building plus installing new light fixtures in the hallways and replacing the ballasts to control the efficiency of the lighting.

The cost of the project was paid through a \$154,900 grant from the two-year American Recovery and Reinvestment Act signed into law by President Barack Obama on Feb. 17, 2009.

Mayor Jack Killion said the project was 100 percent financed with the stimulus funds, costing zero municipal tax dollars. In the end, he said, the solar panels will enable the township to reduce energy consumption at the municipal

Pennsauken Public Safety Received County Hero Scholarship Awards

one neighborhood on one night in late September.

The awards were presented by the Camden County Hero Scholarship Fund at its annual dinner at Lucien's Manor in Berlin on Feb. 25.

Police Officers Matthew Cooper, Peter Fabiani and William Monroe and all Pennsauken public safety departments received the second highest award given by the organization yearly.
